




Progress Toward Yearly Enrollment Target












Consumer Induction by Site




Past 30 Day Substance Use at Intake by Site

Columbia County








General Health






Consumer Satisfaction with Tri-County MATRS Services

The Tri-County Medication Assisted Treatment Recovery & Support (MATRS) Program is a collaborative effort between Tellurian's Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) staff working in conjunction with Sauk, Columbia, and Richland counties' Departments of Human Services. The MATRS Program provides an innovative approach to treating heroin and opioid prescription drug addiction.

The **Population Health Institute's** Evaluation Research group works in partnership with community, tribal and governmental organizations collaborating through the development, implementation and evaluation stages of their programs.

Our projects focus on substance abuse prevention and treatment, maternal and child health, school based health, correctional health and related areas. We use a broad range of methods, from qualitative and descriptive techniques to complex experimental and quasi-experimental trials. We also engage in rigorous intervention research design and evaluation.

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
